THOUGHTS FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

"As the May newsletter reaches you the United Methodist Church General Conference is meeting in Charlotte, North Carolina. General Conference meets every four years, although this is the first gathering since 2016 because the 2020 conference was postponed due to the Covid shutdown. The General Conference is the only entity that can speak for the entire denomination. It is a business meeting where delegates set policy, pass budgets, and address other church-wide matters. It is the only body that can amend the UMC Book of Discipline which includes church law and Social Principles. There is worship and fellowship too.

This year the gathering runs from April 23 to May 3. Among those assembling (including Pastor Troy) are hundreds of voting delegates from across the globe who were elected to represent their regional church body. The delegates, half clergy and half lay people are the decision-makers at General Conference.

Although thousands of Methodists will be attending the conference, there are only 862 official voting delegates. The largest group (55.9%) are from the U.S. Africa, with 32% has the second largest representation, with others coming from Asia and Europe. Some of the languages spoken are French, German, Kiswahili, Korean, Norwegian, Portuguese, and Spanish.

One the difficult topics under discussion is how the UMC will go forward considering the number of churches that have disaffiliated. There is also a proposal for updating the language and streamlining the Book of Discipline.

A very positive emphasis at this conference has been encouraging and empowering women delegates, especially from outside the U.S., to find and use their voices as they make important decisions regarding the future of the UMC.

In local Columbia District News, our current District Superintendent Tim Overton-Harris will be taking a position as a special assistant to Bishop Bridgeforth. Beginning July 1, our new District Superintendent will be Karen Hernandez. She is currently the DS of the Sage District and will add the Columbia District to her duties.

Gardens As Ministry


Jesus went with the disciples to a garden called Gethsemane. He said to them, "Stay here while I go over there and pray." ~ Matthew 26:36

To cultivate a garden is to walk with God. ~ Christian Nestell Bovee

A garden holds significance in our faith tradition. After all, it was in the garden where our life story began. We know, too, that Jesus went to the garden to pray. In Matthew 13, Jesus used the garden as a metaphor for cultivating our spiritual lives when the farmer...

"went out to sow his seed. And as he was scattering the seed some fell along the path and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky places that did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no roots. Other seeds fell among the thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. Still, other seeds fell on good soil where it produced a crop - a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown."

Therefore, gardens not only provide nutritional sustenance. They can nurture our spirituality as well. Writer, Gordon MacDonald proposed that a "Garden is an inner spiritual center - a place of potential peace and tranquility. The garden is a place where the Spirit of God comes to make a self-disclosure to share wisdom, to give affirmation or



rebuke, to provide encouragement, and to give direction and guidance." Gardens can also promote a sense of community and fellowship while

fulfilling the outreach mission of the church to feed the hungry and provide nutritious produce.

The unused expanse of our church property with clear south-facing land provides a unique resource and opportunity to explore possibilities for garden ministry. This would complement, rather than replace or supplant, the current Doula Latinas gardening program by creating a parallel church community garden as a form of ministry. This can extend the reach of our church into the neighborhood and community at large in a variety of ways.

We would like to extend an invitation to interested members of the congregation to engage in a conversation to envision what a garden ministry at Gresham United Methodist Church might entail. While not intended to be prescriptive in any way, we would be happy to bring to the discussion our history and experience of establishing a community garden at our previous church as a form of ministry. 



GRESHAM WOMEN ARE THANKFUL WOMEN!


One of my favorite hymns is "Standing on the Promises". But what are the promises that Jesus gave us?

I Give Thanks for these Promises ...the foundation of my Faith in Jesus Christ! What are your favorite promises? YES, GOD LOVES YOU!


